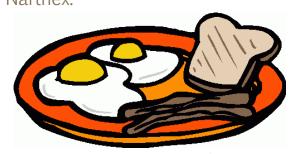

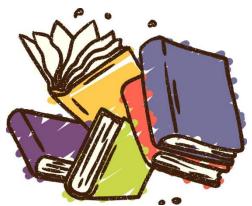

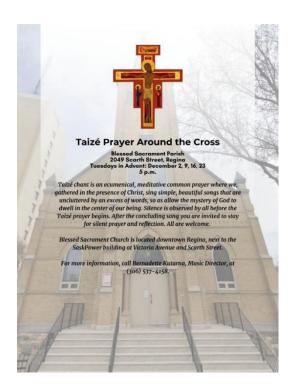

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Advent Message To Rostered Leaders and Congregations of the Saskatchewan Synod ELCIC

November 27, 2025

Dear sisters, brothers, siblings in Christ,

Grace to you and peace from God our Father and our Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ. As we enter this holy season of Advent and draw near to the joyful celebration of Christmas, I write to you with a heart full of gratitude, hope, and deep pastoral concern. These past months and years have carried more than their share of uncertainty. We continue to witness global turmoil, wars and conflicts that fracture communities, financial pressures that weigh heavily on households and congregations, and the ongoing struggle of many of our congregations striving faithfully to keep their doors open. I want you to hear clearly: you are not walking this path alone. Jesus, Emmanuel, God with us, is indeed with us!

Advent teaches us to wait, not in fear, but in expectation. Advent reminds us that God comes precisely into the world as it is: fragile, imperfect, longing for redemption. The Christ child is born not into comfort or stability, but into a world marked by sociopolitical tension, displacement, and danger. And yet, into that world the angels proclaim, "Do not be afraid." That promise still holds. Christ enters our uncertainty with courage; Jesus enters our scarcity with abundance; Christ enters our weariness with new strength.

I want to encourage each of you, rostered leaders, lay leaders, congregations spread across the vast geography of our synod, to trust that God is at work even in what feels small, stretched, or fragile. Your ministries matter however big or small. Your presence in your communities matters. Your faithful witness in these challenging times shines with the light that no darkness can overcome. Do not give up, but walk faithfully and boldly!

As you gather for worship, as you prepare Advent liturgies, as you offer care, compassion, and leadership amid real constraints, know that the Holy Spirit goes before you, beside you, and behind you. The One who promises to be Emmanuel, God with us, is steadfast by our side. The same God who has sustained the church through centuries of change will sustain us now and into the future. There is no doubt about that.

This Christmas season, may you glimpse again the profound hope that comes wrapped not in power, but in vulnerability; not in certainty, but in trust; not in abundance, but in a manger. May Christ's peace settle into your hearts and into congregations, faith communities and ministries of our beloved synod, strengthening you for the ministry to which you have been called.

You are held in my prayers and in the love of the One who is our Light and our Salvation.

Reverse Advent Calendar

in Support of the Regina Food Bank

What is a Reverse Advent Calendar?

Traditional Advent Calendars have you receiving a small gift for every day in Advent. A reverse Advent Calendar has you *giving away* a small gift for every day in Advent.

How does it work?

This year there are 25 days in Advent (Nov. 30 - Dec. 24). For each of those 25 days we are asking you to donate one item for the Food Bank. It can be a Food Item, or a set amount of money (e.g. a toonie, a loonie, or a quarter a day). Gather the food or money together, then bring it to the Church.

What kinds of food should I donate?

The Food Bank's most needed items are canned fruit, canned soup, canned stew, canned fish, canned meat, canned vegetables, rice, dried pasta, pasta sauce, peanut butter, and instant oatmeal. A Reverse Advent Calendar for 25 Days might look like this:

- -3 packages of pasta or rice
- -3 jars of pasta sauce
- -3 cans of fruit
- -3 cans of vegetables
- -3 cans of tuna/salmon/chicken/ham
- -3 packages of instant oatmeal
- -3 cans of soup/stew
- -4 jars of peanut butter

Total: 25 Items of Food

If I go to the store and discover that one of the food items listed is on sale, can I buy 24 of that one item instead of all the different items?

Yes! The above list is just a suggestion. Whatever you can give the Food Bank will happily receive.

What do I do with the food after I buy it?

Bring the food to church and put it it the Food Bank Blue Barrel, located under the stairs to the balcony.

That's a lot of food to carry to the church. Can I give money instead?

Yes! We will happily take monetary donations instead. Please put your money in an envelope clearly marked "Food Bank" and put it in the offering plate or the church office. Cheques can be made out directly to "The Regina Food Bank." Or feel free to donate to Food Bank directly online.

What is the deadline For bringing the food or money to church?

Your food or money can be brought anytime during December, including Christmas Eve. These food items will help keep people fed during the cold months of January and February, when Food Bank donations are often at their lowest.
